Submission of Assignment: The completed assignment should be sent to the Coordinator of the Study Centre allotted to you by 31st March, 2015 (for July, 2014 session) and 30th September, 2015 (for January, 2015 session). Please read the instructions given in the Programme Guide.

All assignments pertaining to any Course must be submitted in one batch. **No place meal submission acceptable.**

The arched stone bridge is an eye, with underlid in the water. In its lens dip crinkled heads with hats that don't fall off. Dogs go by, barking on their backs. A baby, taken to feed the ducks, dangles upside down a pink balloon for a buoy.

Treetops deploy a haze of cherry bloom for roots, where birds coast belly up in the glass bowl of a hill; from its bottom a bunch of peanut- munching children is suspended by their sneakers, waveringly.

A swan, with twin necks forming the figure three, steers between two dimpled towers doubled. Fondly hissing, she kisses herself, and all the scene is troubled: water-windows splinter, tree-limbs tangle, the bridge folds like a fan.

- (i) The objects reflected in the water are compared with different things. Note down the comparisons. (5)
- (ii) Discuss the use of literary devices in the poem. (5)
- (iii) Develop a prose piece around the same theme. (8)
- (iv) Comment on the significance of the title Water Picture. (2)
- 6. Write a passage of 100 words that has grammatical and editing errors. (10) Show correction and then write the corrected version.

1. Given below is a story idea. Your task is to build a story around it. You can choose to make your story serious or comic, depending on whichever you think you can handle better:

The protagonist of your story has been invited by the boss for dinner. Naturally your protagonist wants to create a good impression. However, the spouse has a tendency to drink too much and then talk too much. You story should revolve around this situation, and reach a plausible conclusion.

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2. Given here are 12 random elements. Choose any 5 and include them in a story for children. First list out your five choices, then create a story in which all five of them play some role. A little bit of imagination will help you to develop an interesting plot. Remember, you are being trained to write creatively, so let your creative impulse soar. The 15 things are as follows:

An old enemy/Identical twins/A party invitation/A locked room/Spiders/A fake illness/ A scream/ An unopened letter/ A stranger/ A lie that gets bigger/ A diary/ A stolen ring.

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3. You are awakened from your midnight sleep by your dog barking frantically near the front door. Rushing to your window you look out, only to be confronted by the dark empty street with no movement. You unlock the main door and open it only to see the most horrifying/astonishing scenario that you have ever witnessed........

Now develop this scenario into an open ended story, keeping in mind whether you want to develop it into a "horrifying" or an "astonishing" situation.

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4. For the following question, remember that your writing training has begun and your creative writing powers are being developed by making you think of character, atmosphere, plot and narration.

Your character's car breaks down at night while on a trip to a new place. Fortunately there is a small hotel nearby and the character decides to stay there. The hotel seems creepy (why is it creepy? Create the atmosphere). The character is taken up to his room which is even creepier, by the manager who seems very menacing. (Why is the room creepier? Create the setting. Why is the manager menacing? Describe him). Your character decides to stay on, as he has no choice. He locks his room from inside and prepares to sleep.

Now depending on how you imagine it to be -this could develop into a ghost story/crime/detective/psychological drama or even a comedy! So let your imagination go wild and let your creative juices flow, and write out this story.

Write around 6-10 lines of a poem using this device. 4. (i) Select any statement that holds meaning for you and write down any (10)images that the statement generates in your mind. (ii) Now write a prose paragraph using the same images so that the (10)statement becomes central to the account. (iii) Now rewrite your prose account in verse form. (10)5.
