Relations between the roots and coefficients of general polynomial equation in one variable. Transformation of equation. Descarte's rule of signs. Solution of cubic equations (Cardon method). Biquadratic equations.

SECTION-D

De Moivre's theorem and its applications. Direct and inverse circular and hyperbolic functions. Logarithm of a complex quantity. Expansion of trigonometrical functions. Grogery's series. Summation of series.

SECTION-A

Differential Calculus:

Definition of the limit of a function. Basic properties of limits. Continuous functions and classification of discontinuities. Differentiability. Successive differentiation. Leibnitz theorem. Asymptotes. Curvature. Tests for concavity and convexity. Points of inflexion. Multiple points. Tracing of curves. (Cartesian and parametric coordinates only).

SECTION-B

Integral Calculus:

Integration of irrational algebraic function and transcendental function. Reduction formulae. Definite integrals. Quadrature and rectification Volumes and surfaces of solids of revolution.

SECTION-C

Ordinary Differential Equations:

Degree and order of a differential equation. Equation of first order and first

degree. Equations in which the variables are separable. Homogeneous equations. Linear equations and equations reducible to the linear form. Exact differential equations. First order higher degree equations solvable for x, y, p. Clairaut's form and singular solutions. Geometrical meaning of a differential equation.

SECTION-D

Orthogonal trajectories. Linear differential equations with constant coefficients. Homogeneous linear ordinary differential equations.

Linear differential equations of second order. Transformation of the equation by changing the dependent variable/the independent variable. Method of variation of parameters.
