Introduction

This handbook will give you an overview of the Creative Arts programme. Due to the nature of the course you should refer to Subject Handbooks and individual Module Handbooks for more detailed information on the modules you are undertaking and have chosen. You will find a list of the subject module codes and titles that are available to Creative Arts students below in the Course Content Section.

The Creative Arts programme allows you to choose two main arts subjects to study through the duration of your degree. Subject modules are complemented by a choice of modules that might be subject specific or particular to the Creative Arts course (for example level 6 Creative Arts projects).

An important principle of the Creative Arts programme is the relationship between practice and theory. We assume that you are primarily artists, performers and makers who are driven by the desire to create in a variety of media, and much of your time on the course will be taken up with making and performing. However within the programme, a contextual, theoretical and critical awareness of making and performing are seen to be vital to supporting and enabling your practice.

In all subjects, you will be taught by practitioners who have strong professional profiles as exhibiting artists and designers, published authors, practising choreographers, writers for theatre, and composers or musicians with a record of performances, recordings and broadcasts. Being practitioners, your lecturers understand the problems surrounding the creative process; they also understand the workings of the creative industries – what it takes to be published, heard or exhibited. Throughout your time at the university there will be opportunities to use this knowledge and you will find you will be exhibiting, performing or designing in a professional and public context.

Finally, in Creative Arts, the subjects are largely autonomous, and concerned with development, skills, and knowledge within their own boundaries. However, the projects at Level 3 provide space for cross - subject work and collaboration, allowing an exploration of relations between your two main disciplines. The Creative Arts programme is the only place on the modular scheme where students can freely relate their two subjects in a purpose-built module.

COURSE AIMS - WHAT WILL YOU LEARN?

In addition to knowledge, thinking skills, and skills for life and work derived from the study of Art, Ceramics, Creative Writing, Dance, Drama Studies, Music, Textile Design Studies, or Graphic Arts (please refer to subject handbooks), you will learn the following.

Knowledge:

- A wide range of contemporary practice across two arts disciplines
- Thinking skills
- Versatility in moving between subjects and media
- Versatility in moving between teaching styles
- The ability to relate and draw comparisons between different methodologies

Subject-based practical skills

Please refer to individual subject handbooks for specific skills.

Skills for life and work:

- Development of your own style of independent learning
- Ability to communicate ideas to others and to debate relevant issues
- IT skills
- Communication skills
- Team work
- Time management
- Confidence

LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Learning is encouraged through participation in a wide variety of activities including lectures, seminars, workshops, tutorials, and individual supervision. Contact time for each 40-credit core module at Level 4 is usually 4 hours per week, though this may vary slightly from subject to subject. You should also allow yourself an additional 30 hours each week for private study (student-centred learning). However, you will find that the pattern of contact and non-contact time may differ slightly from subject to subject, and from module to module. Learning is supported by our Virtual Learning Environment, which is called Minerva.

Most tutors on Creative Arts are active practitioners in their subject, and their teaching is informed by their practical experience and their knowledge of the subject's 'industry'. Teaching is further enriched by visits from external practitioners and visiting lecturers.

ASSESSMENT

Students are assessed by a variety of assessment methods depending on which two subjects you have chosen. Please see the individual Subject Handbooks for detailed descriptions of assessment. For each of your modules there will be a module handbook giving details of assessments

and assessment criteria. Please consult these at the beginning of the year.

You should also read the section on Assessment on the Student Services website, particularly with regard to Compensation and Reassessment (on the system of 'deferral' and 'referral' in the event you fail anything) and Mitigating Circumstances (if you are ill or have other reasons for not completing assessments).

WORK EXPERIENCE AND PLACEMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Placements or other elements of work experience are organised within subjects. All work placements take place in accordance with Bath Spa University's Work Based and Placement Learning Policy:

'Programmes containing work based and/or placement learning should have a clear rationale for doing so. Intended learning outcomes should identify the knowledge and skills that students will achieve. There should be an opportunity for personal development planning and reflective practice. Work based and/or placement learning should be assessed according to the appropriate regulations. Students should also be adequately prepared for such learning.'

PROJECT WORK

Creative Arts students can complete a major piece of independent work in Year 3 (see the list 'Creative Arts Projects' in the module grid above). This may be in either of your main subjects, or it may explore relations between them. Teaching is by individual supervision. Examples of cross-subject or collaborative projects have included:

- a music-theatre event;
- dance with film;
- · radio drama with music;
- text as part of an exhibition of work in textiles;
- a CD of songs to specially written texts;
- an art installation or film with music or sound design; The Creative Arts project modules are listed on page 9.

NB Drama is not available in a Creative Arts Cross-Subject project or Collaborative Project. You can combine project work in Drama with Art, Music, or Textile Design by taking DR6002-20 Performance Project and undertaking work in the other subject through that subject's core module: AR6003-40 Individual Practice, MU6001-40 Independent Study or TD6003-40 Studio Practice. Other subjects cannot currently be combined with Drama in this way.

HOW WE ASSURE THE QUALITY OF THE COURSE

Before the course started, a process of course approval took place, which included consultation with academic, and industry subject experts. The following was checked:

- There would be enough qualified staff to teach the course
- Adequate resources would be in place
- Overall aims and objectives are appropriate
- Content of the course meets requirements of Quality Assurance Agency for Higher Education and European Standards and Guidelines
- The course maps to subject benchmark statements
- The course meets any professional/statutory body requirements
- Internal quality criteria, such as admissions policy, teaching, learning and assessment strategy and student support mechanisms

HOW WE MONITOR THE QUALITY OF THE COURSE

The quality of the course is annual monitored through evaluating:

- External examiner reports (considering quality and standards).
- Peer observation of teaching and staff development review.
- University surveys.
- Statistical information, considering issues such as pass rate.
- Student feedback, including module evaluation questionnaires.

The course team uses this information to undertake annual monitoring, which, in turn, is monitored by the University's Academic Quality and Standards Committee.

Every six years an in-depth periodic review of each subject area is undertaken by a review panel, which includes at least two external subject (academic and industry) specialists. The panel considers documents, meets with current/former students and staff before drawing its conclusions. This results in a report highlighting good practice and identifying areas where action is needed.

THE ROLE OF THE COURSE COMMITTEE

This course has a course committee comprising subject leaders or their delegated representatives, student representatives and others who make a contribution towards the effective operation of the course (for example library and technical staff). The committee has responsibilities for the quality of the course and plays a critical role in the University's quality assurance procedures.

THE ROLE OF EXTERNAL EXAMINERS

The standard of this course is monitored by at least one external examiner in each of your two subjects. Their specific duties will depend on the nature of the subject in question.
