Introduction:

The M.A. Programme in English will be taught over 4 semesters. Each semester will consist of 4 core courses and 1 elective course. Students will be required to complete 16 courses of 4 credits each in the core subjects. In addition, a student would be required to complete 2 out of 4 elective courses of 4 credits each available in interdisciplinary subjects . In case no courses are available in interdisciplinary subjects at present, students will be expected to complete these courses in English. In addition, students will have to complete 2 courses of 4 credits each in soft skills and social awareness.
